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FOREWORD

This *Ontario Collective Bargaining Agreement Expirations* report is the forty-fourth annual report on collective agreement expirations produced by Collective Bargaining Information Services (CBIS).

The information in this report is derived from the database of CBIS as at January 28, 2011.

Detailed tables and listings of agreements expiring in 2011 by industry, union, and bargaining unit size are available from CBIS.

The names of employers, bargaining agents, and the number of employees listed for each expiry reflect information received by CBIS at the time of ratification of the most current collective agreement. Bargaining situations resulting from recent or future Ontario Labour Relations Board decisions, or expired agreements that have not been ratified as of the publication date are excluded.

Executive Summary

- The Ontario Collective Bargaining Agreement Expirations report provides an overview of the expected collective bargaining activity in Ontario for 2011. The key findings of this report are summarized as follows:
- Collective bargaining activity for 2011 will involve 2,571 collective agreements covering 496,118 Ontario-based employees. In comparison to 2010, these agreements represent a decrease of 10% in the number of agreements expiring in 2011 and an increase of 25% in the number of employees covered.
- Fifty-six percent of the agreements expiring in 2011 will occur during the months of March, June and December. This is due to the large number of agreements expiring in health and social services (444 agreements in March, 145 in June and 71 in December), municipal administration (28 agreements in March and 97 in December), education and related services (28 in June), and transportation (31 agreements in March, 11 in June and 15 in December). In terms of the number of employees covered, bargaining activity will be concentrated in the months of January, March, June and December, affecting workers in health and social services, municipal and federal government, education and related services, transportation, retail trade, management services, and communications.
- Broader Public Sector (BPS) agreements account for 48% of all agreements expiring in 2011 and cover approximately 68% of the total number of employees
- Of the 1,196 BPS agreements expiring in 2011, a total of 980 are in health and social services, education and related services and provincial administration. Of the 278,296 BPS employees whose agreements expire in 2011, a total of 201,994 are employed in health and social services, education and related services and provincial administration.
- Major negotiations in the BPS for 2011 include hospitals (March, October), municipalities (March, December), nursing homes and homes for the aged (March, September), Toronto Transit Commission (TTC) (March), GO Transit (June), universities (April, June), College Employer Council (support staff) (August), and Police Services Boards (December).
- Key negotiations in the private sector include Metro Ontario (May, November), Pharma Plus Drugmarts (January), Fortinos (June), No Frills Franchise Stores (June), Securitas (June), Garda Security Group (June), G4S Security Services (November)
- Under federal jurisdiction, Canada-wide agreements for Air Canada, Canada Post, Treasury Board of Canada, Canada Customs and Revenue Agency (CCRA), Canadian Advertisers Association/Communication Agencies Institute, and Purolator Courier will also expire in 2011.
- Major unions representing the largest number of employees covered by agreements expiring in 2011 include Canadian Union of Public Employees (CUPE), Ontario Nurses Association (ONA), and Service Employees International Union (SEIU).

According to information received and processed by Collective Bargaining Information Services (CBIS), 2,571 collective agreements covering 496,118 Ontario-based employees (Table 8) are scheduled to expire in 2011. These expiring agreements represent 21% of the 12,262 agreements currently on file and affect 30% of the 1,656,844 employees covered. The number of agreements expiring in 2011 decreased by 10% from 2010, and the number of employees increased by 25%.

Of the collective agreements scheduled to expire in 2011, 48% are broader public sector agreements, covering 68% of all employees. In the broader public sector, the level of bargaining activity will be concentrated in health and social services, municipal and federal administration, and education and related services. The level of bargaining activity in 2011 will be affected by public sector negotiations continuing from 2010 specifically negotiations between the hospitals and various unions. Negotiations of agreements in the health and social services will include nursing homes, homes for the aged, Canadian Red Cross Society (community health services), VHA Home Healthcare, and the Council of Academic Hospitals of Ontario (CAHO).

Major bargaining in the education and related services sector will include McMaster University, Queen's University, University of Ottawa, University of Toronto, York University and College Employer Council (support staff).

In municipal administration, negotiations will proceed for the City of Ottawa, City of Toronto, Toronto Transit Commission, and Durham Regional Municipality.

In provincial administration, collective bargaining will commence for the Greater Toronto Transit Authority (GO Transit), Workplace Safety and Insurance Board, Ontario Provincial Police (OPP civilian/uniform), and Hydro One.

In the federal sector, 2011 expiries will include Air Canada, Canada Post, Treasury Board of Canada, Canada Customs and Revenue Agency (CCRA), Canadian Advertisers Association/Communication Agencies Institute, City of Ottawa Transit (OC Transpo), and Purolator Courier.

Private sector agreements will account for 52% of all expiring agreements, affecting 32% of all employees. Private sector agreements expiring in 2011 will be concentrated in wholesale and retail trade (117 agreements), fabricated metals (81 agreements), accommodation and food services (78), food and beverage (72 agreements), and transportation (62 agreements). Transportation and retail trade cover the largest number of employees.

Economic Setting

In 2011, collective bargaining in Ontario will continue to take place in an economic environment of uncertainty and fiscal challenges. Higher interest rates, a stronger Canadian dollar, higher oil prices and economic challenges in the U.S. will impact Ontario's economic growth. According to a survey of private-sector forecasters, ¹Ontario's real Gross Domestic Product (GDP) is projected to grow by 2.6% in 2011, and 2.8% in both 2012, and 2013 (Table 4).

The annual inflation rate, as measured by Ontario's Consumer Price Index (CPI), averaged 2.5% in 2010, up from 0.4% in 2009. Forecasters ¹predict that the inflation rate will average 2.3% in 2011, and slow to 2.1% in 2012.

The national unemployment rate for 2010 ² averaged 8%, down from 8.3% in 2009. Ontario's unemployment rate declined from 9% in 2009 to 8.7% in 2010, and is projected to average 8.1% in 2011 and 7.6% in 2012.

Ontario's employment rose by 1.7% in 2010, compared to a 2.5% decrease in 2009. Ontario's employment rate is projected to increase by 1.7% in 2011 and 1.8% in 2012 ¹.

In 2010, the annual increase in base wage rates for collective agreements covering 200 and more employees averaged 2%, a slight decrease from the average annual rate of 2.1% in 2009. Wage increases for the public and private sectors diverged, showing a decrease in the public sector and an increase in the private sector. Public sector wage settlements averaged 1.9% in 2010 compared to 2.4% in 2009, while the private sector settlements averaged 2.1% in 2010, an increase from 1.3% reported in 2009.

Activity by Month

The collective agreements covering the largest number of employees are set to expire in the months of January, March, June and December, affecting workers in health and social services, municipal and federal administration, education and related services, transportation, retail trade, management services, and communications. These expiries represent 70% of the total for 2011 (Table 13-15). March expiries cover 29% of all employees, and are primarily in health and social services. Management services (18,094), Ontario-based federal government employees (15,795), retail trade (13,652), and education and related services (11,378) account for 76% of employees whose agreements expire in June. In December, employees in health and social services (9,001), municipal and provincial administration (47,098 and 9,600 respectively) account for 67% of the total.

In terms of the number of collective agreement expirations for 2011, most activity will be concentrated in March (health and social services, transportation, other services, and municipal administration), June (health and social services, universities, other services, retail and wholesale trade, transportation, and management services), September (health and social services), December (health and social services, other services, and municipal administration).

Activity by Industry

Collective bargaining in 2011 will be concentrated in the non-manufacturing sector as a result of the large number of agreements expiring in health and social services and municipal administration. A total of 1,859 collective agreements (excluding construction) will be expiring in the non-manufacturing sector, and account for 72% of all agreements expiring in 2011. Of these non-manufacturing agreements expiring in 2011, the Broader Public Sector (BPS) accounts for 64% of non-manufacturing agreements and covers 62% of non-manufacturing employees.

The manufacturing sector accounts for 18% of all agreements expiring in 2011, covering 8.5% of all employees. Bargaining in this sector will be concentrated in fabricated metals, food and beverage, non-metallic minerals, and transportation equipment, which together will comprise 53% of all expiries in manufacturing. The largest number of employees covered by manufacturing agreements (474 agreements) expiring in 2011 will be in transportation equipment (23% or 9,471 employees), food and beverage (19% or 7,837 employees), and fabricated metals (10% or 4,381 employees).

Non-construction private sector agreements account for 42% of all agreements scheduled to expire in 2011.

Activity by Union

A total of 103 unions will be bargaining on behalf of all employees whose agreements expire in 2011. Ten unions represent 76% of the total number of employees covered by the expiring agreements. Ontario Nurses Association will be negotiating the largest number of agreements (13% of agreements), and the Canadian Union of Public Employees (CUPE) will be representing the largest number of employees at 18% of the total number. ■
